Through partnerships with local public library systems in the region, JRAC educates our youngest river lovers on the value of the river and its myriad resources with **James River Story Time**. An early literacy story time focuses on rivers, lakes and other bodies of water. Children hear stories, sing songs and make crafts.

For our older crowd, JRAC offers a deeper dive into the history of the James River through its **Forgotten History** lecture series. This summer, historian Emmanuel Dabney presented a lecture on education, emancipation and race in antebellum, wartime and post-war Richmond.

# River Looks Like




**Playing on the James** is one of the best ways to build river love. The river offers something for everyone — history, festivals, outdoor sports or just relaxing by the river. The James has it all!

The annual James River Days brochure provides a wealth of recreational, social, historical, environmental and educational opportunities to connect with the river. This comprehensive catalog of events provides residents and visitors, alike, with options to play on the river from April through October.

James River Week is a week-long celebration of the James River that marked

its fifth anniversary in September. JRAC partners hosted select river-related events during the week. Despite impending tropical weather, JRAC, James River Association and James River Outdoor Coalition hosted Films on the Floodwall as part of the week's lineup. The event included feature films, MacGillivray Freeman's "National Parks Adventure" and "5,000 Miles of Wild."

Rescheduled as a daytime, decorated boat parade in July due to inclement weather in December 2017, the beloved **Parade of Lights** was once again canceled due to the deluge of rain the region experienced this summer. The planning team is working with its dedicated boater community to make December 2019's parade the best one yet!



Also, in 2018, JRAC partnered with the Richmond Symphony to celebrate its 60th anniversary with the **Festival of the River**. This special three-day event showcased the very best of the James River, Chesapeake Bay and the Richmond region. Highlights included contemporary art installations, performances under the Richmond Symphony's "Big Tent," litter cleanups and family-friendly environmental education activities.





Each year, hundreds of community members come out to give back to the river they love by participating in the James River Regional Cleanup. Cleanups sites span the watershed from Appomattox County to Newport News, making it a truly regional initiative. Together, our community works to keep our river attractive, clean and healthy.

# Stewards of the River Awards

Established in 2006, the annual awards are presented to people or groups who have made measurable, positive impacts to the James River and surrounding communities.

### **Education Award**

Blair Blanchette, Virginia grassroots coordinator, Chesapeake Bay Foundation

Blair oversees outreach and volunteer activities, including the VoiCeS and Grasses for the Masses programs, for the Chesapeake Bay

Foundation in Richmond. She often goes above and beyond her work responsibilities to expand her understanding of the natural environment. Her focus on education has ranged from schoolaged children to diplomats from foreign embassies. She is an active member of JRAC and has served on the regional cleanup planning committee since 2014. She has led more than 350 volunteers during cleanups and recruited volunteers for the Falling Creek Reservoir site.

Justin consistently communicates, provides support and collaborates with JRAC to advance the needs of

to advance the needs of the James River. Justin always answers the call to be an engaged member of JRAC and is integral to projects such as the James River centralized information site and James River Week Films on the Floodwall. City of Hopewell, Stormwater Management & Recreation and Parks departments Accepted by Charles Dane, Assistant City Manager


City of Hopewell is building coordinated and collaborative partnerships to improve

the waters of the James River watershed and enrich recreation experiences. Hopewell has engaged JRAC's southernmost partners and supports organizations such as the Friends of the Lower Appomattox River to promote the removal of trash, tires and debris from the river. The city has also invested in water treatment and stormwater improvements, the Hopewell Riverwalk and the "Paint out Pollution" program. Hopewell's substantial investment in partnerships and programs that improve water quality and recreation indicates a community and leadership that care about our rivers.

Trained in water quality testing as a James River Association River Rat, Dr. Henry has led her own annual trainings in the community, developing a corps

of 47 volunteers who monitor 27 sites on the Peninsula. Dr. Henry has led a group at Lucas Creek, a satellite site of Huntington Beach in Newport News, for the JRAC cleanup for the past three years. She engages with the city of Newport News to remedy water quality issues promptly and has devoted many hours to sharing information with citizens, particularly young people. Her current quest is to develop a project to work with the Mariners' Museum to map and monitor the outfalls of Lake Maury.

Author and photographer Will Daniel captures the heart of the James River in his work.
Will's book, "James River

Reflections," includes more than 250 photos that reveal the majesty of Virginia's James River from its humble beginnings on private property to the point where it meets one of the nation's busiest seaports. The James River is also included in the second book of his river photo series, "My Virginia Rivers." His images celebrate the river's unique character and help connect people to it. He has shared his photographs with JRAC for years, and they have been featured in annual reports, promotional materials, Films on the Floodwall and the JRAC website.

**Leadership Award** 

This award is presented to individuals who have served in leadership roles with the JRAC and whose tenure has ended or is ending. This award is presented in appreciation for years of service to the organization through quidance and direction.




Carson Tucker, JRAC co-chair and Powhatan County Board of Supervisors
